Mission Statement

The Bradford Public Library is committed to supporting and enhancing learning, creativity, and opportunities for personal growth and community connections with reliable information and resources, and the support necessary to navigate those resources

in a safe and welcoming environment.

Administrative:

The Vermont Department of Libraries' \$10M for Public Facilities Preservation Initiative Grants for small, rural public libraries in Vermont will be open for application in the coming weeks. The goal of this funding is to provide resources to address repair and mitigation needs in small, rural public libraries that also serve as community meeting spaces and public facilities, with a focus on economically depressed areas. Grants:

VT Reads ~ We received 100 copies of this year's chosen title "Gather", written by Oxbow HS Principal Ken Cadow. We are planning multiple programs surrounding this annual statewide community read and discussion opportunity.

Courier Grant ~ This year the grants will be for \$683.80 covering half the cost of one stop per week to be used toward payment(s) to the courier service vendor. This grant is very important in that it allows us to say "yes" to many requests without being bound to costs accrued by the USPS.

Technology:
