

April 17 , 2025 Librarian's Report Bradford Public Library

Mission Statement

The Bradford Public Library is committed to supporting and enhancing learning, creativity, and opportunities for personal growth and community connections with reliable information and resources, and the support necessary to navigate those resources in a safe and welcoming environment.

Administrative:

On March 14, President Trump issued an <u>Executive Order</u> intended to dismantle the only federal agency dedicated to funding library services, the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), as well as six other agencies. The executive order would apply to about 30% of the VT Dept of Libraries overall budget which helps to pay for <u>ABLE</u>, the Interlibrary loan database(CLOVER), <u>Vermont Online Library</u> databases, the courier grant which helps with the cost of interlibrary loan courier delivery, Continuing Ed offerings, and general support from the Vermont Department of Libraries. Based on my understanding, Congress passed a Continuing Resolution in late March that funded the IMLS grants through September 2025. However, we don't know if the executive order or the dismissal of IMLS staff which took place will affect that at this point. While the executive order does not explicitly shut down the agency, the shortage of **funding** could have detrimental consequences for many...We also understand that the loss of federal funding would impact local libraries differently.

A day in the library:

Wednesday, 12:30pm; an 82 yr old woman comes to BPL for tech support. She was told "the BPL Librarian can help." We set up her brand new computer and coached through basic skills so that she could access and manipulate ordinary computer processing including personal microsoft account / operating system, search engines, email, and more...Immediately following, another patron needs assistance and brief education on saving important documents via free Google Drive, rather than or in addition to printing out multiple documents.Moving right along, we support a young woman in finding the necessary adapters in order to download updates to her XBOX via wifi... We've got this and success! 5:00pm comes quickly and it is time to close the library.

SO MUCH MORE THAN BOOKS ~ and more than daily tech support, it is the personal connection between library staff and our patrons. It is knowing that one staff member may be a better fit than another for communicating with someone and that all of us have a part to play, something to offer. There are a surprising number of people in the community who live alone, without family or assistance, who do not have the increasingly necessary skills for many everyday tasks that are crucial for both personal and professional success in today's digital world. Librarians not only provide access to information and resources but actively engage with the community, tailoring services to meet diverse needs often on a personal level.

The carpeting in the children's room needs replacing

A portion of the \$10,000 ALA LTCAccess3 Grant award will support the installation of custom made window treatments to reduce glare which make it difficult to see the screen clearly. Six shutter blinds will fill the upper windows in the dodecagon shaped room of our historic building and create a more comfortable viewing environment.

Technology:

We need to think about replacing the two IMAC 2011 computers in the Mezzanine.

A portion of the \$10,000 ALA LTCAccess3 Grant award will support the purchase of ViewSonic 86-inch 4K UHD bundle format presentation display, WIFI and wall mount, and Echenbach Vario Digital FHD desktop video magnifier that will enlarge an image of text onto a monitor screen, allowing for contrast changes to make text easier to read for those with vision impairment.

LUV Audio:

We have resumed our subscription to the LUV Audio Collection Rotation. We receive approximately 30 audio books every 3 months for circulation.

Grants:

- BPL has been awarded Rapid Response Grant from VT Humanities to support the purchase of multiple copies of a new release for BPL READS discussion and visit with the local author. Sasha Hom's *Sidework* is a lyric, page-turning novella about a homeless Korean adoptee and mother of four.
- \$830 from Little Rivers Health Care will cover the cost of the Teen Drama Camp Playwrights workshop coming in April. Participants will be working with Kaylie

Larkin of Plainfiend , NH. Kailie holds Masters in Theater Education from City College of NY and has worked as a teaching artist, school residency coordinator, summer program director, and full time teacher in grades K-8. With student-led devising and technical ownership at the core of her work she has directed over 30 productions with students ages 12-18. Her teaching expertise includes improvisation, devising, Shakespeare, clowning, mask, shadow cinema, puppetry, playwriting, and filmmaking. This workshop will prepare us for this years' *BPL Teen Drama Camp '25* production. We will decide on a date for this production as a group. • Vermont Humanities has approved a grant in the amount of \$3200 for the 2025 Humanities Teen Drama Camp for Bradford Public Library.

***The Vermont Humanities Council took a significant hit losing 42% of its annual budget after the latest move by the Trump Administration to slash federal spending. We are not yet sure how this will affect our program budget for next year. The Vt Humanities Council supports many BPL programs including: Spanish Language, MANGO, Children's literacy training and program funding through VELI, VT Reads, Discussion Series, Humanities Camp (Teen Drama) and more.

BPL CREATES ~ Meets on the first Thursday of each month. On April 3, we created Window Decals on the Cricut Machine with Pam Benware. These decorative window decals can deter birds from crashing into windows! On May 1 we will be CREATE-ing upcycled jewelry art with Cheryl Maynard.

Mahjong ~ This group plays Mahjong each Thursday from 2 - 4 pm. Experienced players help beginners to learn the game.

Spanish Language / Conversation group ~ The Spanish language group meets every Tuesday at 12:30 with at least ten learners in attendance and new members each week.

Tuesday Homeschool Meetup ~ This group is growing and bringing folks from Groton, Corinth, Topsham, and Bradford. A few older homeschooling children from New Hampshire attend the Friday Art Club as well.

Toddler Story Hour ~ Children join Ms. Gail each Friday at 10 am for stories, songs, and crafts. Parents and caregivers appreciate Story Time as an [affordable] opportunity for children and their adults to make new friends, share with others, and practice fine motor skills.

Friday Afternoon Art Club ~ Elementary school aged kids interested in drawing, paint, clay, collage and more join Ms, Gail on Fridays from 3 - 4:30 pm. Weekly projects are on display in the children's room. This program has dwindled due to local Winter Activity Programs, Skiing, and Basketball programs offered at the schools.
